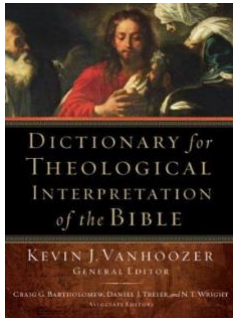

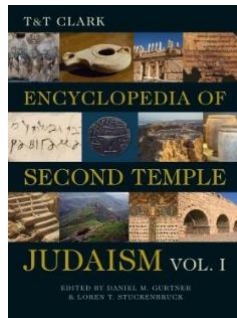

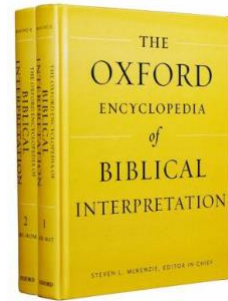

The Dictionary for Theological Interpretation of the Bible

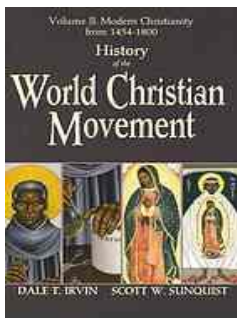

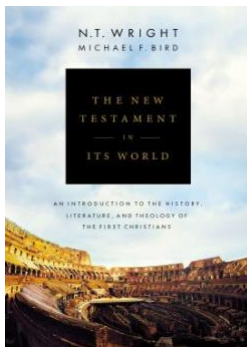
